The Scripture

"Then Nathan said to David, "You are the man!" This is what the LORD, the God of Israel, says: 'I anointed you king over Israel, and I delivered you from the hand of Saul. I gave your master's house to you and your master's wives into your arms. I gave you the house of Israel and Judah. And if all this had been too little, I would have given you even more. Why did you despise the word of the LORD by doing what is evil in His eyes? You struck down Uriah the Hittite with the sword and took his wife to be your own. You killed him with the sword of the Ammonites. Now, therefore, the sword will never depart from your house, because you despised me and took the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your own.'

"This is what the LORD says: 'Out of your own household I am going to bring calamity upon you. Before your very eyes I will take your wives and give them to one who is close to you, and he will lie with your wives in broad daylight. You did it in secret, but I will do this thing in broad daylight before all Israel.'" ¹³Then David said to Nathan, "I have sinned against the LORD." Nathan replied, "The Lord has taken away your sin. You are not going to die. But because by doing this you have made the enemies of the LORD show utter contempt, the son born to you will die."

Sin Brings Consequences

Sin is something that you never "get away with."

"God does not allow His children to sin successfully." — Charles Spurgeon

- The Joy: God forgives us when we sin.

"Then David said to Nathan, "I have sinned against the LORD." Nathan replied, "The Lord has taken away your sin. You are not going to die." - 2 Samuel 12:13

"In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance with the riches of God's grace." - Ephesians 1:7

"The next day John saw Jesus coming toward Him and said, "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" - John 1:29

- The Sorrow: We will live with the consequences of our sin.

"Now, therefore, the sword will never depart from your house, because you despised me and took the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your own." - 2 Samuel 12:10

David had suggested that "this man" deserved to die and must pay "four times over" for the lamb that he had taken. Of course, he said this before he realized that he was that man.

David's Consequences

Some believe that God used David's own words of "four times over" to help him pay the consequences for his sin. What are the four?

1. **Humiliation:** All Israel would know of David's sin.

"You did it in secret but I will do this thing in broad daylight before all." - 2 Samuel 12:12

"A record of the genealogy of Jesus Christ the son of David, the son of Abraham; ...⁶and Jesse the father of King David. David was the father of Solomon, whose mother had been Uriah's wife." - Matthew 1:1,6

2. **Violence:** The "sword" would always be with David.

"Now, therefore, the sword will never depart from your house, because you despised me and took the wife of Uriah the Hittite to be your own." - 2 Samuel 12:10

"Absalom ordered his men, "Listen! When Amnon is in high spirits from drinking wine and I say to you, 'Strike Amnon down,' then kill him." - 2 Samuel 13:28

3. **Sexual Sin:** There will be chaos (calamity) in David's house.

"This is what the LORD says: 'Out of your own household I am going to bring calamity upon you. Before your very eyes I will take your wives and give them to one who is close to you, and he will lie with your wives in broad daylight.'" - 2 Samuel 12:11

"So they pitched a tent for Absalom on the roof, and he lay with his father's concubines in the sight of all Israel." - 2 Samuel 16:22

4. **Death:** The son born to David and Bathsheba would die.

"But because by doing this you have made the enemies of the LORD show utter contempt, the son born to you will die." - 2 Samuel 12:14

"David noticed that his servants were whispering among themselves and he realized the child was dead. "Is the child dead? He asked. "Yes," they replied, "he is dead." - 2 Samuel 12:19

What Do We Learn About Consequences?

1. Although God removes our sin "as far as the east is from the west," He normally does not remove the consequences of sin.
2. Many of the consequences that we face are natural.
3. Many of the consequences of our sin will last a lifetime.
4. It is futile to spend time fretting, complaining, or being bitter about the consequences of our sin because it only makes us useless.

²¹*His servants asked, him, "Why are you acting this way?"*

While the child was alive, you fasted and wept, but now that the child is dead, you get up and eat!"

²²*He answered, "While the child was still alive, I fasted and wept. I thought, 'Who knows? The LORD may be gracious to me and let the child live.' But now that he is dead, why should I fast? Can I bring him back again? I will go to him, but he will not return to me."* - 2 Samuel 12:21-23
