Possessing an Attitude of Gratitude

Introduction: Overview of Numbers

The children of Israel were to learn that ...

- 1) They must trust God and not humans in a crisis.
- 2) God will supply every need that they have.

Potentially, Israel had everything they needed to fulfill God's Plan for their lives at that moment.

Realistically, Israel did not receive everything they needed to fulfill God's Plan for their lives at that moment.

Why? They Possessed an Attitude of Ingratitude

Observations:

- 1) Our tendency to sin is greater at certain times than at others.
- 2) God's discipline is related to our development.
- 3) A godly leader saved the people from destruction.

Israel possessed an attitude that ...:

- 1) Was unaffected by God's discipline.
- 2) Was unappreciative of God's benefits.

Israel was out of Egypt, but had not yet truly been delivered. Their bodies were free, but their spirits were still in bondage.

- 3) Soon forgot the past problems.
- 4) Was insensitive to their calling.

The Truth About a Complaining Spirit

1) A Complaining Spirit is contagious.

v. 4

2) A Complaining Spirit has a selective memory.

v. 5

Dissatisfaction comes when our attention shifts from what we have to what we don't have.

3) A Complaining Spirit is not satisfied with what's available. v. 6

Israel allowed one loss to keep them from rejoicing over many gains.

4) A Complaining Spirit wants to be heard by others.

v. 10

The difference between a concerned person and a complaining person:

Concerned Person — Expresses their view to the right person and then leaves it.

Complaining Person — Expresses their view to every person and never leaves it.

5) A Complaining Spirit can cause the leader to sin.

v. 10-15

Moses forgot his role as a leader and because of the pressure he felt from the people, he too began to complain.

Role of a leader:

Moses' displeasure was different than God's:

God's displeasure — over their ungratefulness toward Him.

Moses' displeasure — over the people complaining to Him.

Moses' complaining was different than the people's:

Moses — complained to God.

People — complained about God.

Moses — complained to God alone.

People — complained about God to others.

6) It has its roots in self-centredness
